Hello Dear Loved Ones,

"I forgot to stop". This was the answer I gave to my father on a beautiful spring afternoon as to why I had just run full speed into a tree. You see moments before, while playing with some friends at the park, someone suggested we race for the title of *The Fastest Kindergartener at the Park*. Who was I to deny myself the chance at such a title? The starting line was drawn in the sand with the heel of a shoe and the finish line was the first to touch the mammoth of a maple tree at the edge of the park. The tree was the most domineering edifice in the whole park and was impossible to miss.

With the future Olympic 100-yard dash competitors ready on the line, someone said "On your mark, get set, go". I flew off the line with nothing but victory in my mind. Sand flew into the air with every step. I looked down at my feet only to see a blur of indistinguishable movement. No one was near me and how could they be, I was speed personified. Confident that the race was in the bag, I decided to turn to see the distance by which I was going to beat my opponents. Had they even gotten off the starting line? Were they so amazed at my speed that they just stopped to watch? I wanted to make sure they saw me win the race when all of a sudden... BAM. I ran face first into the trunk of that giant maple tree.

I learned the difference that day between running to a tree and running into a tree. With a bloody ear and cheek, scraped up knees, hurt pride and tear filled eyes, I hobbled back to my dad who asked what happened. "I forgot to stop" may have been my answer, but it was not the truth. The truth was, I became more focused on my running mates than I was on the finish line.

Hebrews 12:1-2b tell us that, "Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight, and sin which clings so closely, and let us run with endurance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus, the founder and perfecter of our faith..."

I wonder how often we treat the race to Christ like I treated the race to that grand ol' maple. We become focused on the "cloud of witnesses" around us instead of the "founder and perfecter" before us. Beloved, let's run the race the way in which the author of Hebrews instructs us to run. We should run in a way that encourages one another, not focused on comparing ourselves to one another. We should ask for help when it comes to laying aside the sin which encumbers and ensnares our progress. We should continually be reminded to keep our focus on Jesus, the founder and perfecter of our faith. Stay focused Loved Ones. Keep your eyes on Jesus as the finish line of His coming approaches. Let us not be caught running into Jesus, but encourage one another to run to Him.



Mission Aviation Fellowship Democratic Republic of Congo





Alfred and Jewel Ottosson are preparing to serve in the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC). As a pilot/mechanic, Alfred, will take part in helping reach isolated people in the DRC by bringing supplies for their spiritual and physical needs. Jewel will continue as a stay-at-home mom and hopes to seek out opportunities where her background in teaching can be used for God's glory. Currently, they are in France for one year of language school. In early 2025, they plan to go to Bunia, DRC, to serve in these roles.
